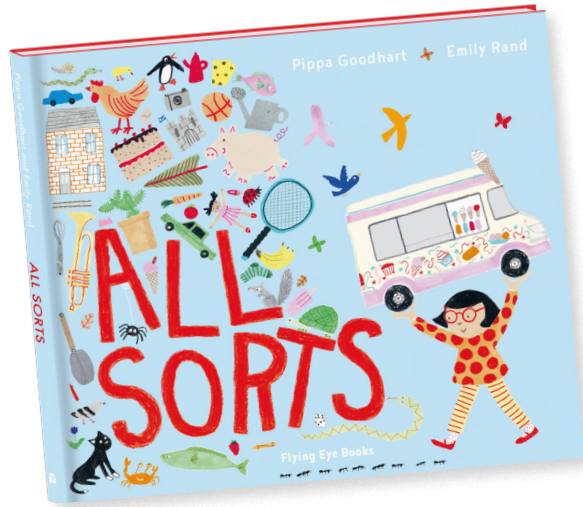

Find some flowers. Smell the different flowers and describe the smells. Do you think you could identify them by smell? Roses, jasmine and lilies have very strong smells!

What kind of dances would be in your happy dance? Maybe you could do the monkey, the twist, or the crocodile? Have you tried any dances recently that you could mix together?

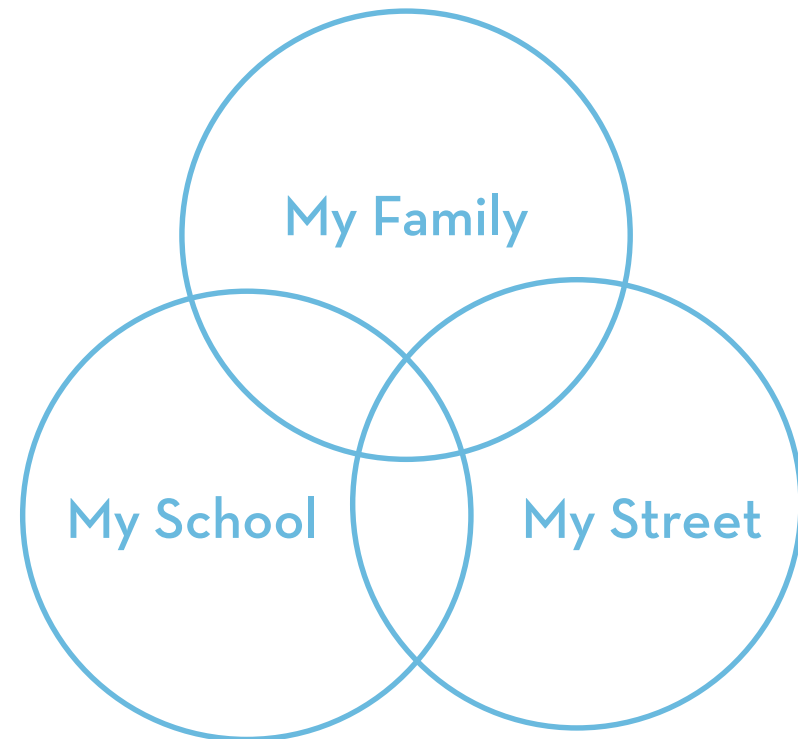
Make up your own happy dance and name it.
